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THE KENNEDY CENTER ANNOUNCES RECIPIENT OF 22nd ANNUAL AWARD RECOGNIZING OUTSTANDING SCHOOL BOARD SUPPORT OF THE ARTS

Putnam City Schools Board of Education Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts announced today that the Putnam City Schools, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma has been chosen to receive the 22nd annual Kennedy Center Alliance for Arts Education Network (KCAAEN) and National School Boards Association (NSBA) Award. The district was singled out from nominees around the country for their outstanding support of high-quality arts education. School boards were nominated by State Alliances for Arts Education and State School Board Associations.

The award, which includes a \$10,000 prize, will be presented on April 12, 2010 at the National School Boards Association's annual conference in Chicago, Illinois. Since 1989, this prestigious national award has recognized a school board for their support of arts education.

“Exposing students to the arts has a remarkable ability to increase academic and social development,” said Darrell M. Ayers, Vice President of Education for the Kennedy Center. “We are impressed with the efforts of Putnam City Schools, and all they do to provide a valuable arts education experience to their students.”

A national review panel is convened to select the winning school district each year. In order to be selected for this national honor, candidates must demonstrate support for all four artistic disciplines in their arts education programs including visual arts, music, theater, and dance. Instruction and programming must be available for all students throughout the district. The ways in which the school district develops collaborative partnerships with the cultural resources available in the community are also an important consideration.

PUTNAM CITY SCHOOLS, OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA

The School Board of Putnam City Schools is committed to providing standards-based arts education opportunities for all students. Putnam City Schools is the fifth largest school district in Oklahoma, with a

student population of 18,790 in the elementary, middle, and high schools. There are arts programs in all schools as well as an Alternative A+ Arts Academy at the high school level. The board has consistently proven its support of the arts by making the financial and administrative commitments needed for a strong arts education program throughout all grade levels. They have committed 5.94% of the instructional budget for arts programs and support a fine arts coordinator; music chairs in general music, vocal music, band and orchestra, and 95 full time arts teachers. The School Board has also approved issuing bonds for the maintenance of current arts facilities and construction of new facilities for arts education and presentation.

The school board of Putnam City Schools continually reinforces the arts as core subjects by focusing on standards, assessments, and professional development opportunities for teachers. Although the school district is not required to do so by the State Board of Education, Putnam City Schools carries out assessments in four arts disciplines each year to gain data that helps to improve the arts education opportunities offered. The standards and assessments used by Putnam City Schools were also used to help develop the Oklahoma state standards in the arts. The Board supports professional development by setting aside time and funds for teachers to meet in arts planning teams and professional learning communities at the school and district levels, attend multiple professional development workshops in the arts each year, and participate in local and national arts education associations such as the National Art Education Association and MENC, the national association for music education. These opportunities allow Putnam City Schools' teachers to focus on arts integration and artist residencies.

The School Board of Putnam City Schools created a learning environment where all students experience the arts, regardless of economic status. To help fund these opportunities, the board has eliminated the need for charging fees and rentals in many classes. In those classes where fees and rentals are still necessary, assistance is given to those students who cannot afford them. The school board also works with parent groups and the Putnam City Schools Foundation to raise funds for arts education in the district. To enhance students' arts experiences, the Board supports collaborations with local organizations such as the College of Fine Arts and Design at the University of Central Oklahoma and its Center for Arts Education, the Oklahoma Alliance for Arts Education, the Oklahoma City Philharmonic, the Perpetual Motion Dance Company, the Oklahoma City Art Museum, and numerous businesses in the community that partner with schools.

Each year, the school board of Putnam City Schools presents a theme supporting the arts to help inspire the district. Previous themes have included "The Arts: Planting Seeds of Creativity" and "The Arts: Exercising Mind, Body, and Spirit." School board meetings showcase upcoming student performances and provide updates on student accomplishments in the arts. The School Board actively and enthusiastically encourages state and national Youth Arts Month efforts, serving as advocates for continued strong arts

education in schools.
