Modeling what she has done in hundreds of elementary school classrooms, Amy MacDonald uses a writer's perspective to lead teachers through several brief writing exercises and the creation, writing, and revision of a group story.

AMY MACDONALD is the author of a dozen children's books. Her books have won awards in three countries, been published in 22 languages, and made the *New York Times* list of the top ten children's books for the year. A writer all her life, she has worked as a journalist and editor for many major newspapers and magazines in this country and in Great Britain and France, from the *Times* of London to *The New Yorker*. Ms. MacDonald has taught writing to all ages, from kindergarten through elementary, middle, and high school, at the university level, and to post-graduate students and adults. She has also taught expository and creative writing at Harvard University, the University of Maine, and at the Stonecoast Writers conference.
